

Notes on the bookplate (E421) reproduced opposite

Nehemiah Asherson is a retired Harley Street ear nose and throat surgeon who operated on Maeve Gilmore and all her children. In lieu of fees, Mervyn Peake presented him with paintings and with drawings made specially for him. Learning that Mr Asherson collected first editions of his books, Peake made sketches of characters on the endpapers, adding that, to avoid slandering anyone, he always used his own face for caricatures. The idea of a bookplate was suggested by Mr Asherson, who showed Peake a historiated capital in Cowper's Myotomia (1724), but the design Peake produced is entirely his own. The original drawing is some eight inches square. The three little bones of the middle ear – the malleus (hammer), incus (anvil), and stapes (stirrup) – are used to form both the letters of the words and the horse, where they are in an anatomically correct order against a background depicting the inner wall of the middle ear. It also figures a fourth ossicle, a bone which has since been shown not to exist.
